



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## **April Meeting**

Following the AGM, the Vice-Chairman, John Higgs, gave a personal view of the River Lea which rises in Bedfordshire and flows on to meet the Thames at Leamouth, near the area which was recently regenerated for the 2012 Olympic site. John grew up in Tottenham, near the river, and with slides, many of them made from his vast postcard collection, was able to paint a vivid picture of the contrasting pastoral nature of the river bank quite close to London and the industrial buildings, including the Royal Small Arms Factory at Enfield, Bryant and May's and Lesney (Matchbox Toys). These had grown up along the banks because in former times the river had been a major artery for trade with London.

An attempt to preserve the riparian habitat resulted in the establishment in 1967 of the Lee Valley Regional Park which runs from the River Thames to Ware. It is a linear park of about 26 miles with major reservoirs and multiple water courses (rivers and canals), to carry the river and also to provide navigable waterways and flood relief channels. A skilful melding of natural history, geography, industrial history and his own memories meant that the talk had something of interest for everybody.

## **GROUP REVIEWS**

## **Birdwatching**

After an early start we spent the first beautiful spring day of the year at Blashford Lakes just north of Ringwood in Hampshire. This is a delightful reserve with a range of habitats for wildlife, excellent footpaths and bird hides. The bird feeders in the woods were attracting a wide variety of birds, providing a constantly changing picture. We were particularly pleased to see redpolls, bramblings and siskins still here and now in their impressive breeding plumage. The woods were full of birdsong as chiffchaffs and other new arrivals joined in with our resident birds in their spring preparations. Around the lakes sand martins were gathering near to a specially constructed nesting area, a couple of common terns put in an appearance to join the noisy blackheaded gulls and all the other usual water birds. We were lucky to find a group of dunlin still there, now in their breeding plumage. Yet another excellent day out in wonderful surroundings bursting with spring life and full of birds.

#### **Book Circle 1**

In our April book, *The Fist of God*, the author, Frederick Forsyth, uses his now well-worn scenario of infusing facts with fiction to increase the impact of the story he is attempting to tell us. This time his protagonist is Major Mike Martin, an extremely clever indefatigable SAS officer who is tasked to discover if Saddam Hussein has managed to produce a weapon of mass destruction, and if so where is it concealed. Martin's accomplished covert operation has the mark of a fine spy thriller in the towns and cities of Iraq and Kuwait. Obviously Forsyth has done immense research, but doesn't seem to know what he wants this book to be. Is it a documentary or a novel? Six hundred pages are over-padded with the information he wishes to impart. We are told about the workings of all armed and security services in detail: historical names and places are commonplace and acronyms abound on every page.

Such a mix has worked for Forsyth before, for example *The Day of the Jackal* and *The Ipcress File*. Sadly this time a potentially interesting story is submerged under the weight of factual data.

#### **Book Circle 2**

The book for April was *On Beauty* by Zadie Smith. It is set in a fictionalised New Hampshire college town, Wellington, and portrays the lives of two professors who are at opposite poles of academic culture and of their families who are entrenched in one another's lives. It is loosely based on *Howard's End* by E M Forster of whom she was a great admirer. All her characters have flaws and the plot follows their disintegrating relationships and human failings. There are, however, many amusing episodes in the book. The author was a visiting lecturer for one year at Harvard and one feels she drew on her life there to comic effect.

The book had a mixed reaction. One member disliked it intensely; most of us admired her prose style, her detailed descriptions of people and places and most of all her use of dialogue. Some felt she should have made more of her experiences to bring to the fore the issues of race, class and culture which feature in the book; some felt it was too long and had an unsatisfactory ending. Discussion was animated and to the point, the various reactions making it a lively afternoon.

## **Family History 1**

At our April meeting Ray Russell gave a talk on 'Family Skeletons'. The talk started with the brief history of his cousin Maureen, who at eight years old was evacuated in 1944, at the time of the V2 rockets landing on south-east London and Kent. She went to live with a family called Winkley in Lancashire, but she never returned home. Her father never saw her again, and her sister Joyce had to wait 60 years to see her again. The reason was that she had been fathered by her real father's brother, Alfred. Ray found Maureen in 2006 and reunited the two sisters. The skeleton: her mother.

The second skeleton was Ray's grandfather William, a policeman in 1906-1909 who claimed to have killed a burglar with his truncheon, and so resigned from the Metropolitan Police. The truth was he fraudulently claimed expenses from the force and ran up debts and was asked to resign.

The third skeleton was Ray's grandmother who married in 1903, had three babies, one of which died and the other two being given up to other family members. She left her real husband in 1907, and bigamously married William, without telling him she was already married. She had seven more babies, all illegitimate.

Two further skeleton stories were given, both of which included the birth of illegitimate children.

He was a man of practical competence, moral conviction and human understanding.
